# JACOB AND ESAU: SELF-CONTROL

LESSON #2

**TEACHER'S GUIDE** 

#### **LESSON OVERVIEW**

**Big Idea:** The story of Jacob and Esau is a lesson on self-control **Key Question:** How can we show self-control in our lives?

Memory Verse: "A person without self-control is like a city with broken-down walls." Proverbs 25:28

**Overview:** We're continuing in our series about guarding against things that can ruin our lives. Last week, we looked at the story of Abraham and Lot and how selfishness caused trouble for Lot. We need to be more like Abraham who was selfless. Today we're going to talk about self-control. Self-control is all about making good choices. We're going to look at a story in the Old testament about twin brothers who learned an important lesson in self-control. Even though they were twins, Jacob and Esau were very different. Esau was a hairy hunter. Jacob was a homebody who loved to cook. Esau was the older twin which meant he had a more important position in the family than did Jacob. Esau had the birthright, which meant when their Dad died, Esau would get twice as much money and stuff than Jacob. It was a big deal. One day, Esau came home after a long day and he was really hungry. Jacob had just cooked a yummy soup and it was all Esau could think about. He wanted soup and he wanted a lot of it. But before Jacob would share, he made Esau give him his birthright and Esau agreed. What a bad trade! Esau had no self-control and he ended up trading away his future for a bowl of soup! Don't let a lack of self control ruin your life.

### **TEACHER TIPS**

Don't forget that you set the tone for your kids. Smile. Have fun. Pursue God together.

When we want something bad enough, we're willing to give away a lot in order to get it. That's what Esau did in the story we'll learn about today.

#### Answer: By making choices that honor God.

Self-control is about making good choices and not letting ourselves get carried away by our emotions. The best way to know if you're making good choices is by obeying what the Bible says. God gave us the Bible as our instruction manual for life. It tells us what what we should and shouldn't do. So, we are showing self control when we choose to obey God even when we're tempted to do something else.

**Bonus Questions:** What is self-control? What book helps us to make good choices?

**4-5th**: How can a lack of self-control hurt us? What are some areas in your life where you need to have more self-control?

God **doesn't** want us to have fear or to be timid. **(lack courage or confidence)** Instead, God **gives** us power, love and self-discipline (another word for self-control). That is such good news! God gives us the power and desire to make good choices. Remember that when you're tempted to make a bad trade or choice. God has given you the ability to say, "No" to the bad stuff and "Yes" to the good stuff.

## Option #1

### Jacob and Esau King of the Hill

- Tape a square on the floor and choose one kid to start in the square as the King.
- Have the other kids line up single file facing the King.
- The King and the first kid in line will face off. Ask a question from below, the first to answer correctly wins the round. If the King wins, he gets to stay in the square. If the kid in line wins, he gets to be King and the other kid goes to the back of the line.

# Option #2

#### **Jacob and Esau Soup Craft**

- Give each kid a paper plate half.
- Give each kid a soup template (page 5).
- Have kids cut out some of the vegetables.
  - Have them color the plate black for the pot.
  - Have them color each vegetable a different color.
- Have them glue the vegetables to the back side of the plate so it looks like the vegetables are cooking in the pot.
- Then, have them glue the phrase to the front of the plate.
- As the kids work, remind them of the story of Jacob and Esau and how Esau's lack of self control led him to make a bad trade. Remind the kids how important self control is in their lives so they don't make bad trades (or bad choices).


